We want you to learn, expand yourself, and have fun. But safety first! Our security and safety program will see to that. With your cooperation, we will continue our nearly stellar record of having one of the safest campuses in Philadelphia.

How do we do it? Consider this:

- 24/7 security guards
- Nightly inspections of security guards by a manager
- Residential Learning Coordinators on duty seven nights a week and all day Sunday
- Computer-operated door controls that let us know who is arriving and when
- 4-digit code entry for rooms
- 220 closed-circuit TV security cameras that cover the campus
- Fire drills in the classrooms and dorm buildings
- Fire equipment that exceeds the city's requirements
- ID cards that are door "keys"
- Extra lighting, not only in our buildings but on the sidewalks
- A director of facilities who routinely inspects all utilities
- Residential Learning Coordinators and facilities team inspections of rooms
- Cell phones and radios connecting staff and security
- Of course, you need to add your own cooperation to the list to keep us safe, sound, and ready for fun.

Valuable Tip: Don't bring excessive jewelry, sentimental items, or excessive money to campus. Consider purchasing a small briefcase-style, fire-resistant safe.
